IAAP Education Foundation Scholarship Programs

Members of the Illinois Association of Aggregate Producers (IAAP) believe in the importance of encouraging and facilitating students to pursue an education in a field of study that will open opportunities to work in the crushed stone, sand, gravel, and industrial mineral mining industry in Illinois or a career teaching Earth Science or Geology.

This year the IAAP awarded six scholarships of at least \$2,000 each between two scholarship programs. These scholarships are a one-year grant for direct educational expenses. Students may re-apply in subsequent years.

The **Education Foundation Scholarship** supports students learning and training to be the next generation of professionals in the industry.

In 2021, he completed an internship with RiverStone Group where he learned quality control procedures and examined cores from exploration drillings.
